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KEVIN COTTON

Mr. Kevin Cotton is the Chairman of the Board of Directors and training director for the Texas Alive Team. He has spent much his career focused on issues related to juvenile justice and has brought that wealth of experience to the Texas Alive Team. He has been a Travis County Sheriff's deputy for the last ten years. Six of those years, Deputy Cotton has acted as a school resource officer serving in Austin area high schools. Prior to his career with the Sheriff's office, he served as a juvenile probation officer in Travis County.

Judge Mary Craft is a Senior District Judge and served on the 314th Family District Court of Harris County Texas from 1995 to 2002. She was Associate Judge of that court from 1988 to 1994. From 1977 to 1988 she had a family law practice and was board certified in family law.

Since 2003 Judge Craft has served as judge of the Three Rivers Foster Care Court, hearing child abuse and neglect cases in Wharton, Liberty, Chambers and Waller counties.

Mr. Crain is the Multimedia Specialist for the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center. Jameson graduated with a bachelor's degree in Political Science from Arizona State University in 2008. Judge Elizondo has served as an Associate Judge, City of Southside Place since 2000. She is a Seattle, Washington native with a B.A. & M.A. from Seattle University. Prior to law school Judge Elizondo taught Physical Science and English in Houston, Texas and Colon, Republic of Panama. Judge Elizondo graduated from South Texas College of Law in 1977 and worked as Corporate Counsel for two large corporations until 1984. She has been in private practice over 25 years with an emphasis on law relating to children. Judge Elizondo was president of the Association of Women Attorneys-Houston and is an experienced presenter at State Bar of Texas and Houston Bar Association programs.

DAVID GARZA

Judge David L. Garza is the Presiding Municipal Court Judge for the City of Bee Cave, Texas. He was first appointed to that position in 2010.

Prior to his current position with the City of Bee Cave, Judge Garza served as a City of Austin Municipal Court Judge from 1987 to 1992 and then again from 2003 to 2009. Judge Garza has also served the State of Texas as an Administrative Law Judge for the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) from 1992 to 1993. He has also served as an Assistant District Attorney for Travis County and as an Assistant Attorney General for the State of Texas, where he was Chief of the Foreign Prosecution Unit under then Attorney General, John Cornyn.

Judge Garza received his B.A. in Psychology from the University of Houston in 1975. He received his J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center in Washington, D.C. in 1978 and his

MBA from The University of Texas at Austin in 1991.

Judge Garza is a member of the State Bar of Texas, the Texas-Mexico Bar Association and Association of Attorney Mediators.

He is a native Texan, having been born and reared in Corpus Christi, Texas and has been a resident of Austin, Texas since 1980.

Mr. Goodner serves as the Presiding Judge for the City of Woodcreek and is the Program Attorney and Deputy Counsel for the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center. Prior to joining the Center, he worked in civil litigation in Austin. Mr. Goodner graduated from The University of Texas, School of Law with a juris doctorate and certification in the Graduate Portfolio Program in Dispute Resolution in May of 2007. She also served the State of Texas as a Commissioner for the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Office Standards and Education, the Professional Ethics Committee, and the Judicial Ethics Committee.

URSULA HALL

Judge Ursula Hall comes from a long line of socially, civically and politically involved citizens. She was inspired by her parents along with her grandfather, J.E. "Jimmy" Middleton, legendary advocate for union workers. Judge

Hall also gives credit for her success and her desire to improve her community to her grandmothers, Quintanna Hall Alliniece and Winnie Middleton.

Judge Hall graduated from a local public magnet school for the academically gifted and talented, Wellesley College, and South Texas College of Law. She was a student champion in the trial-related activities of debate, moot court and mock trial (at both the University of Texas School of Law and South Texas College of Law).

Judge Hall has served as a Judge for more than seven years. She is a (thrice) reappointed Associated Municipal Judge with the City of Houston. She has practiced law, as a sole practitioner, for the last sixteen years. She is also licensed to practice before the United States Supreme Court and the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals.

RYAN S. HENRY

Ryan Henry graduated with honors from New Mexico State University with dual bachelor's degrees in Criminal Justice and Psychology in 1995. He attended law school at Texas Tech School of Law and graduated in May of 1998. While attending law school, Ryan began clerking for the Lubbock City Attorney's Office and began prosecuting in municipal court. Judge Lewis concluded 10 years of Service in the Texas House of Representatives when the 79th Session of the Texas Legislature commenced on January 11, 2005.

After graduating from Paul Laurence Dunbar High School in Fort Worth, he enrolled at Prairie View A&M University. Prior to graduation, he returned home to Fort Worth where he completed his undergraduate work. He earned an A.A. degree from Tarrant County College and a B.A. from Texas Wesleyan University. He went on to earn a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from The University of Texas School of Law in Austin, Texas.

He was recently appointed to the Texas State Advisory Committee to the United States Commission on Civil Rights. In 2010, he was chosen by the Fort Worth Business Press as one of 12 "Power Attorneys" in Tarrant County. He is also Vice Chairman of the Board of Directors of United Way of Tarrant County.

HOPE LOCHRIDGE

Ms. Lochridge has served as the Executive Director of the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center since 1991. Prior to that she was the Director of the Public Service/Law-Related Education Department of the State Bar of Texas and the Executive Director of Law Focused Education, Inc., a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation dedicated to educating young people about the law. Judge Rebecca Schlosser is the Municipal Judge in the City of Alpine as well as an Associate Professor in the Educational Administration Program of Sul Ross State University. She was a former Government Attorney in private practice, both in Texas and Florida. Previously Judge Schlosser served as the senior litigator for the City of Houston. She received her Doctor of Jurisprudence and Texas license in 1983, her Florida license in 1999, and her Doctor of Education in 2006. Ms. Schlosser was formerly a School Law Section of State Bar of Texas Presenter and is a reporter for the Education Law Association.

ROBIN D. SMITH

Judge Robin D. Smith is the Presiding Judge of the City of Midland Municipal Court. He has served in the position since November of 1984. Prior to that appointment, he practiced law as a prosecutor for the City of Midland from 1982 to 1983 and operated as a solo practitioner from 1983 to 1984.

Judge Smith's educational accomplishments include a bachelor's degree in economics and psychology from Oklahoma State University and a Juris Doctorate from Texas Tech University.

His professional association work includes serving as Chair of the State Bar of Texas Municipal Judges Section from 1989 - 90 and President of the Texas Municipal Courts Association twice, in 1991 - 92 and 2008 - 2009. He served on the TMCA board of directors from 1986 to 1997, from 2001 to 2005 and in 2007 to 2010. He has also served the American Bar Association including a term as the Chair of the National Conference of Specialized Court Judges. In 1997, Judge Smith was appointed by Chief Justice Tom Phillips to serve on the Texas Judicial Council where he served until 2001.

From 2002 – 2004, Judge Smith was selected as the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration Judicial Fellow. As Judicial Fellow, he provided input for the United States Department of Transportation on policy and publications. He was also frequently called upon to speak on traffic safety issues for the Administration.

Among honors, the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce recognized Judge Smith as one of the "Five Outstanding Young Texans" in 1994. The Texas Municipal Courts Association named Judge Smith "Judge of the Year" in June 1998. In 2001, He was presented the American Bar Association's National Conference of Specialized Court Judges' Education Award. The State Bar of Texas Municipal Judges Section presented Judge Smith with the Michael J, O'Neal Outstanding Jurist Gavel Award in 2002, and he is a four time winner of the City of Midland Management Award.

He is a frequent speaker for several groups including the National Judicial College and the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center. In addition, he has spoken at judicial training seminars in several states. Judge Smith is considered to have expertise in the areas of search and seizure, constitutional criminal procedure, juvenile law and traffic law.

In addition to his activities and position at the Midland Municipal Court, he edits and publishes the Texas Municipal Court Justice Court News, which has more than 800 monthly subscribers.

KATIE TEFFT

Ms. Tefft is the Program Director for the TMCEC. Prior to joining the Center, she worked as Project Attorney on the 7th edition of Dawson's Texas Juvenile Law under contract with the former Texas Juvenile Probation Commission (TJPC) and as a Drafting Attorney in the Attorney General's Open Records Division.
